Dear Rev. Fathers, Deacons, Matushki and faithful,

Christ is in our midst! He is and ever shall be! Welcome to the 58<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Assembly. We are blessed to have Fr. Innocent Neal and the faithful of Holy Trinity to host us this year. Thank you. As we have completed another year and enter into the new, it is appropriate to evaluate and reflect on 2021. The past year was difficult and challenging on many levels, perhaps full of stress, anxiety, fear, depression, loneliness, isolation and personal loss for some. Many were affected physically, emotionally, psychologically and spiritually. Our clergy were greatly strained with trying to meet the needs of the faithful who were all at different places in their own struggles. In a number of parishes the laity stepped up to assist with ministry to the faithful in a variety of ways, as was and is appropriate. Hopefully, this lay participation in ministry will continue. We are truly blessed with dedicated clergy and laity. Therein lies the true wealth and assets of every parish and the Diocese as well.

We have many challenges before us and we must clarify in our hearts and minds our priorities. Our Chancellor, the V. Rev. Fr. Martin Browne presented us with an excellent overview of our current situation. We can no longer continue as though things will remain unchanged. The clock only moves forward. There is a shortage of clergy throughout the OCA, we have a number of parishes with a large percentage of the faithful over 65, few under that age and declining membership. *This is something money cannot fix!* Without a concerted effort on the parish level to attract and retain new members, we need those parishes to honestly assess their options. Examine your census demographics and consider where the parish will be in five years if nothing changes. Some parishes may have already passed the point of no return. As our elderly clergy begin to retire, we will likely not be able to have a priest at every parish regularly. Be kind to your priests, supportive appreciative and encouraging. We will eventually see parishes unable to properly and legally administer their own affairs and / or populate a parish council in accordance with their own bylaws, etc.

As we ponder our mission as a Church, to share the Gospel, our blessed hope in the Resurrection and to be a light within the local community, we must always remain focused on personally growing in our faith and our relationship with the Lord. He is the Source of Life. We must rise above parochialism, i.e., a limited commitment involving a particular parish and realize we need Christ, the Church and the Sacraments. We, as a Diocese will not abandon the faithful, but we require your cooperation in order to do so effectively, without burning out our limited clergy. By the Grace of God, clergy of parishes which continue to provide in-person adult education, continue to receive new members consistently. Growth, even in the last two years remained possible because people are searching for meaning and what lies beyond this life.

Given the shortage of clergy much falls on their backs and they all go above and beyond my expectations in caring for the clergy and the faithful.

Let us be mindful of those who are suffering from loneliness, depression, isolation, anxiety and stress. As St. John the Theologian says in his First Epistle, "*Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action.*"
